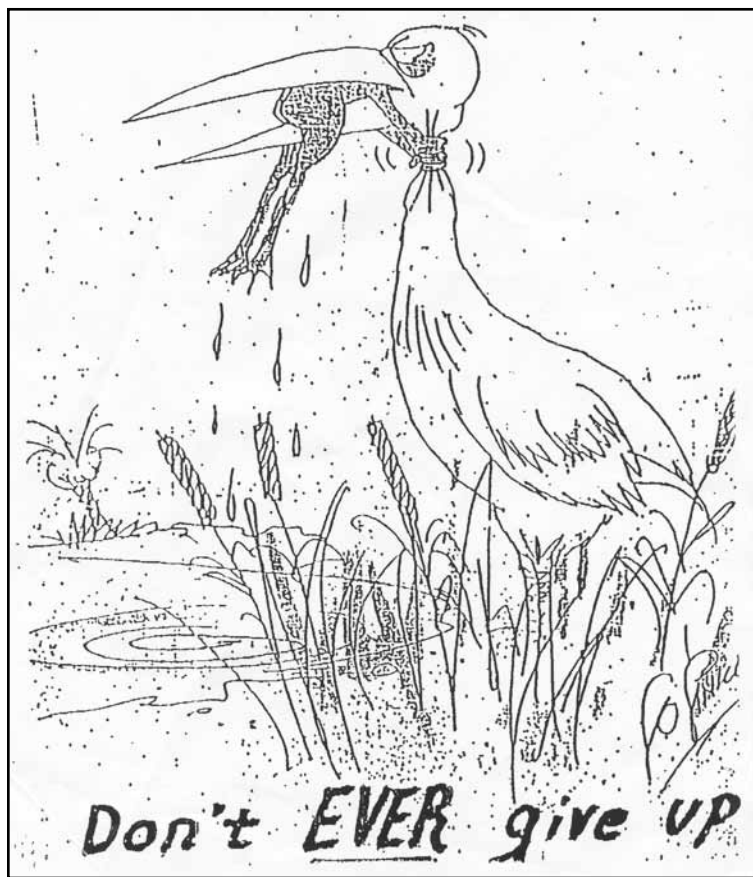

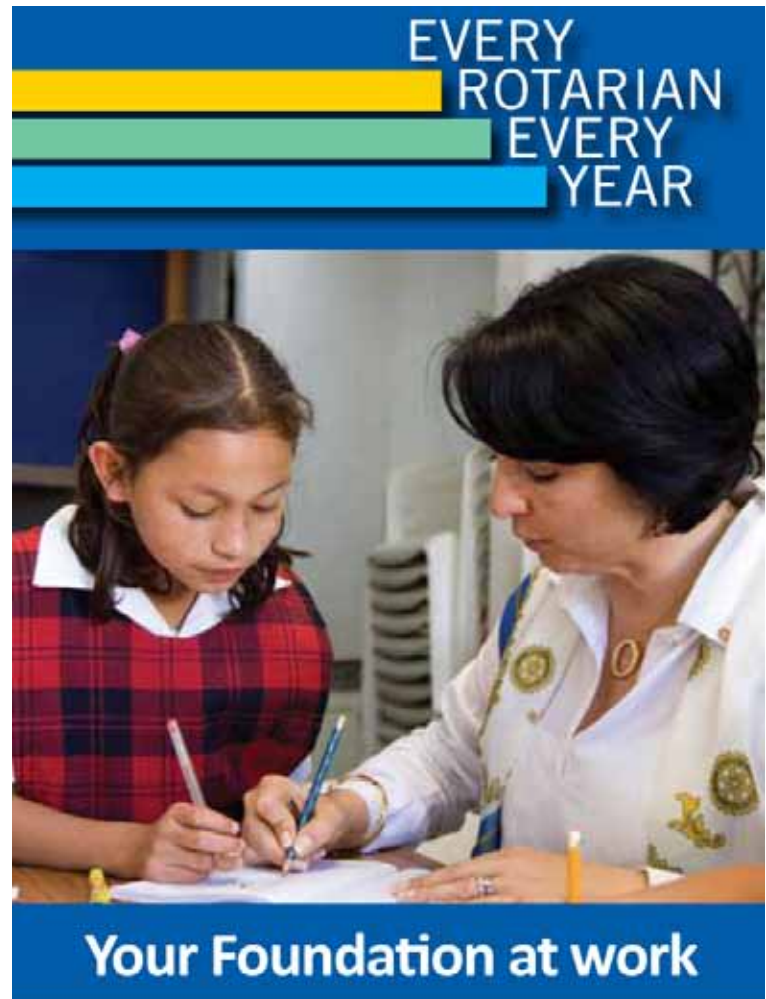

## Rotary Club of Lynn Haven awards its \$1,000 Polio Plus raffle winner

At the recent 4th of July celebration at Sheffield Park, the Rotary Club of Lynn Haven offered locals a chance to win \$1,000 and help end Polio worldwide.

Local Mary Pike was the grand prize winner. The 90-year old retiree said, "I was stunned and surprised when I got the call. I've never won anything in my life.

"I will use the money to pay bills and a few special things. Rotary does so much good for our community," She continued. "I remember growing up, polio was such a

terrible disease. I am glad to be part of ending it."

The Rotary Club of Lynn Haven raised more than \$1,200 profit that will go toward Rotary International's Polio Plus program to eradicate Polio, in partnership the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The Gates have committed to match every dollar Rotary raises 2-to-1, up to \$35 million a year thru 2018.

"We plan on having more Polio-plus fund-raisers and raffles in the future, so look out for them," Club President-elect Tracey Gibson added.

There are still three countries (Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan) with hundreds of reported cases. The

challenge is their geographical isolation, poor public infrastructure, armed conflict and cultural and religious barriers.

"With this last, strong push we can truly eliminate the scourge of Polio. We are just a small part of a global effort to make the world a better place," Lynn Haven Rotary President Ron Sharpe said.

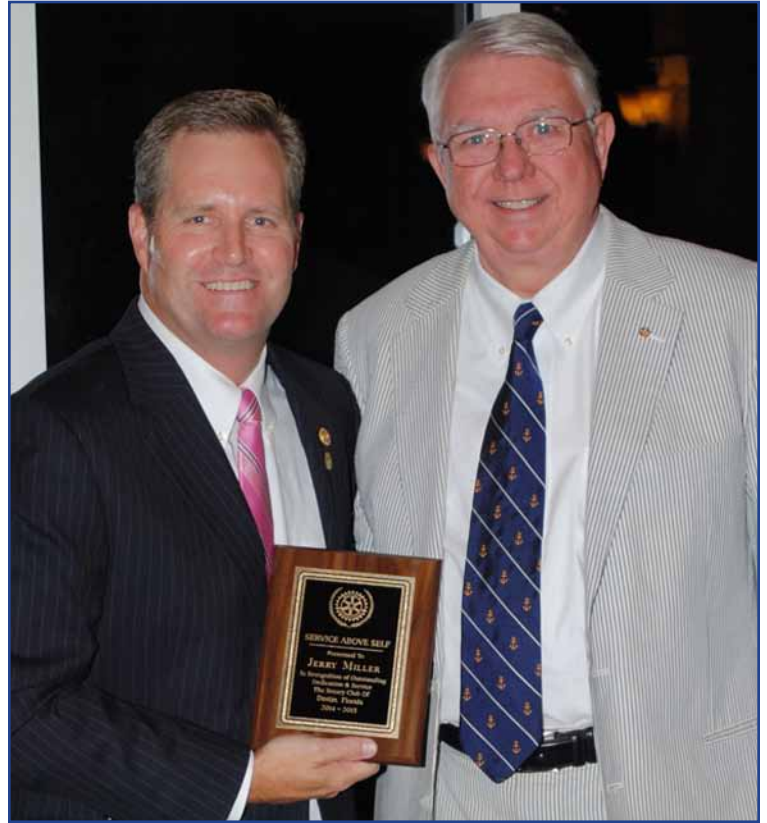

### What is an e-club?

### How does an e-club operate?

E-club members use webinars, videoconferencing, message boards, instant messaging, or tools like Skype and Google Hangout to communicate. For example, a club member might post content online for that week's meeting, then other members join the discussion throughout the week. Some e-club members also meet in person at service projects, social activities or the RI Convention.
