Rotary Club of Fort Walton Beach Presidential Citation Award Winner for 20 Years

Today's Speaker: Patrick Berry General Manager, Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park



Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park has been a mainstay in the Florida Panhandle and the Emerald Coast. We have been connecting people to the Gulf and the world's ocean inhabitants for over 62 years. Our mission is educating, entertaining, and inspiring its guests to respect and preserve wildlife by providing unique and memorable experiences for visitors of all ages to connect with marine life. In addition to our educational presentations and interactive animal programming we work to play a part in conserving the marine environment. One way

of expanding on that mission is with the recent development of our non-profit Gulfarium C.A.R.E. Foundation. The Center acts as a beacon for coastal conservation through marine animal rescue and rehabilitation, encouraging awareness with public education and opportunities for active participation.

Our acronym C.A.R.E. stands for:

Conserve to ensure the future of marine animals and their habitats

Act by playing an active role in marine conservation

Rehabilitate by supporting marine animal rescue, recovery, and release

Educate by inspiring awareness for marine conservation issues

Patrick Berry is the General Manager of the Gulfarium and the Director for the C.A.R.E.

Center. He has worked in the marine mammal field for 28 years. Under his leadership, the 62-year-old facility has been through a renaissance including rebranding, creation of animal interactive programs, new habitats, expansion of the animal collection, complete refurbish-

ment of life support systems, and Alliance and IMATA facility accreditations.

Prior to arriving at the Gulfarium 6 years ago, Patrick was the Marine Mammal Zoological Manager for the Walt Disney Company in their Animal Programs division. He has worked with marine mammals at a variety of levels through his career including as a trainer, husbandry coordinator, supervisor of training, curator, director of animal management and director of animal programs in not only the United States, but also the Bahamas, and French Polynesia (Tahiti).

His broad experiences with marine mammals range from research with cetaceans including physiological studies which have been published, to husbandry, interactive training, open ocean training, film work in a variety of genre with dolphins, conservation projects, show presentation and lectures. His roles have also included interactions with government regulatory agencies such as the National Marine Fisheries Service, United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission as well as serving on the board of directors and committees of the Alliance of Marine Mammal Parks and Aquariums and the International Marine Animal Trainers' Association.
