He has held prior economic development leadership positions with the Economic Development Partnership of Alabama, the Sat. Joe Company and the Brunswick and Glynn County Development Authority (Georgia).

Nathan was awarded a B.A. from Oglethorpe University and graduated from the University of Oklahoma's Economic Development Institute. He received the Certified Economic Developer (CEcD) designation from the International Eco-

nomic Development Council and was awarded the prestigious Business Ambassador Award from Governor Rick Scott in 2016.

Nathan serves on the United Way of Okaloosa & Walton County Board of Directors. In his free time, Nathan enjoys travel, golf, and college football.

Rotary Leadership Institute—FAQ's

Q—These sessions are titles "Rotary Leadership Institute" classes. Are they only for current or potential leaders in each club? Or, can anyone attend?

A- The classes are for anyone interested in learning more about Rotary. They include information about Rotary, Rotary Opportunities, Foundation Basics, Fundraising, Service Projects, Grants, Strategic Planning, Ethics & Vocational Service, Leadership Strategies, International Service, Communications Techniques and more. Non-Rotarians may also attend.

Q- Does each location offer all 3 parts?

A- Each location will have all three parts running simultaneously in different class-rooms. They run from 7am (check-in and breakfast) until 3:15pm. Part I has 5 sessions, Part II has 6 sessions and Part III has 6 sessions. Each part will have a different Discussion Leader per session. Parts I, II and III are taken sequentially. Each Part is in one classroom. The Discussion Leaders change while the students stay in the same classroom all day. A Discussion Leader will leader one session in a Part.

Q- Can I take all three Parts on the same day?

A– Unfortunately, not. A Part runs a full day and the parts are taken sequentially.

Q— What is the cost?

A—Each Part is \$100 and includes course book, full breakfast and lunch. Our club reimburses the registration fee after the Part is completed.

Q—Can all 3 Parts be taken in 1 year?

A—Yes. 4 dates/locations are being offered in 2020 so all Parts can be completed in one calendar year.

- January I I—Pensacola (registration deadline is January I)
- January 25—Lake City (registration deadline is January 15)
- February 8—Panama City (registration deadline is January 28)
- February 29—Tallahassee (registration deadline is February 19)

Q—How does one register?

A—Log in to www.dacdb.com, then click on the calendar and scroll to the desired date. Click on "Register Now".

Bahamas Disaster Relief Update

Change in Direction

It appears that District 6990 which includes the Bahamas has more than 6 Cargo Containers of supplies on hand now and are distributing daily. Many other organizations are now up and running so the immediate needs of the people (water, foods, and the other items on the list) are now being met. They are changing their focus to helping to rebuild basic public services and housing and providing basic medical needs. What will be most important in the months to come will be the donations we make through our Rotary Foundation Disaster Relief Fund (See District Website). We will continue to gather some basic supplies; but we will be packing and storing items for the next disaster. Unfortunately, another one will come along all too soon and we want to be ready to provide aid on day one, without having to organize and spend weeks collecting before we can help.

We are looking at Disaster Relief as an ongoing mission in District 6940 an we trying to put together a standing committee for this purpose. We are looking for one Rotarian from each of District 6940's 10 Areas to form the District Disaster Relief Committee. Each committee member would be responsible for coordinating the Rotary Relief and Recovery efforts in their area. As we are very spread out, most meetings would be by conference call, and we would communicate by telephone and email. When we are 'activated' for a relief effort, the committee member would be the key person in their area leading the operation in their area clubs. Total new cases of wild poliovirus stands at 85 globally.

Afghanistan has had 16 cases in 2019 compared to 19 cases YTD in 2018 and 21 cases for the full year. Pakistan has had 69 cases YTD 2019 compared to 8 YTD 2018 and 12 for the full year. Since vaccinations were resumed, the rate of new cases has slowed tremendously. The last reported new case was August 28. The huge surge in new cases in Pakistan when the country halted its vaccination program highlights the need for us to continue until polio is gone. Nigeria should be certified polio free in January.
