Today's Speaker—Pam Braseth Emerald Coast Fitness Foundation

Pam Braseth is a retired youth coach and teacher. She was a High School and College basketball player. Pam graduated with degrees in Food Science and Nutrition, Education and Business Mgt who taught High School and coached basketball in the '80s, coached baseball, tennis and softball in the early 90's, before becoming a swim coach after her family came to Fort Walton Beach in 1994 through a military move.

Shortly after arriving Pam began to teach swim lessons at the local YMCA, coach adults in 1996 and youth in 1998. During her 20 years as a resident of Fort Walton Beach, Pam served on the Y board, and stepped in to help Choctaw Swim Team . At the same time she took on the role as the Volunteer Head Coach of the Play Swim Team.

After those positions were filled, she was asked to help with Fort Walton Beach High School's team and the Bluewater Barracudas year round team. Within two years she was named Head Coach of both Teams. During this time she also started the LJPS middle school swim team.

Pam formed a 501c3 non-profit organization with the Bluewater Barracudas and was the Coach for 6 years until she medically retired in 2010.

Pam coached 10 years with the FWB Vikings, 2 as Assistant Coach, 7 as Head Coach and 1 as a volunteer to help the team transition to a new Head Coach. After forming the Liza Jackson Lions Swim Team, Pam coached the team through 12 seasons.

In 1996, Pam and her husband Bruce with another couple opened Dragon Sports to provide the swimming, biking and running community members with quality athletic gear at fair prices. 18 years later, the store has the same mission and supports the community through sponsorship of local teams, races and other community events.

Working "part-time" now, Pam is a Tax Preparer with 30 years experience, she coaches adult swimmers and triathletes through the Masters Swim Team – OLD1 and continues to work in the family business.

Pam is a member of Impact 100, an organization of women that financially support local non-profit organizations by empowering women as philanthropists and leaders.

Pam is married and the mother of 2 Okaloosa County Middle School and High School swimmers. Her oldest son, Pete, played Water Polo for 4 years in college and continues to swim on the Masters Team. Her younger son, Mike, is a triathlete like his Dad, racing distances up to and including the Ironman. He too practices with the Masters Team.

What You Should Know About the 2016 Council on Legislation

Rotary representatives from around the world who met in Chicago April 10-15 took several historic actions that will grant clubs greater flexibility in their meeting schedule and membership.

How Will the Council Action Affect My Club's Meeting Schedule? The council overwhelmingly voted to eliminate limitations on how clubs conduct their meetings. Clubs now have the option of amending their bylaws to vary their meeting days and times. And they are now able to decid when to cancel a meeting, as long as they meet at least twice a month. Clubs are still expected to forward attendance reports to the district governor within 15 days of the last meeting of each month.

What Constitutes a Meeting?

The Council felt strongly that clubs are in the best position to determine the meeting format that works best for their members. Any club can meet in person or online, or use a mixture of these formats. It could even use both formats at the same time. (For example, a member could use Skype to participate in a physical meeting.) Clubs can also choose to replace a traditional meeting with a service project or social event.

How Will The Changes Affect Club Membership?

Rotary will continue to recognize two kinds of membership—active and honorary. But clubs may now choose to offer additional membership categories—such as associate, corporate, or family membership—creating alternative financial, attendance, and service expectations. However, for these members to be recorded as members of RI with the full benefits of membership, clubs must report them as active members and pay per capita dues accordingly.

Does My Club Have To Adopt These Changes?

No. The Council action did not explicitly remove or modify the existing rules and traditions in Rotary's governing documents. Any club that still wishes to follow the traditional requirements for meetings, attendance, structure and categories of membership may continue to do so.

The Rotary Foundation—I 00 Years of Doing Good in the World

At the 1917 RI Convention, outgoing RI President Arch C Klumph proposed to set up and endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

In 1929, the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals/

When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the

Club History Corner

1953—The *Playground Daily News* ran on its front page the following: **Rotary Club Holds Initial Meeting**

Walt Ruckel, a member of the Niceville Rotary Club, presided over the formation as the sponsor for the Fort Walton Beach Rotary Club. Lamar Kelly was installed as the club's first President; Ross Marler, Vice President; Kenneth Rogers, Secretary; and Roger Pryor as Treasurer. The first officially chartered meeting was February 23, which is the same anniversary as Rotary International—unique distinction at that time. The date also corresponded to the number of members -23.
